Notes on Nowell Sing We

Nowell Sing We is a medieval English carol (circa 1450). It is, largely, about the birth of Christ, the joy in the birth, and his role is saving everyone leading to eternal life in heaven.

I've chosen to use the original text, a sort of early modern English because it so closely and happily fits the sprightly melody. This is a macronic carol, using words in English and Latin. The Latin is, of course, unchanged from the Latin still common in the Catholic Mass. The English are mostly familiar. The rest of the text is pronounced as if the words modern English. They just have slightly different meanings or no longer exist in English. A slight exception are the two words that begin with a "y". We will pronounce that letter as a short "I", as in "it". Below is a glossary of unfamiliar words and phrases. Enjoy!
